# Chorus of celebrities call for release of Bob Lovelace and the KI Six

In the latest development in the jailing of Bob Lovelace and the KI Six, Stephen

Lewis, Margaret Atwood, Sarah Harmer and other prominent Canadian authors, artists, musicians and publishers are calling on Premier Dalton McGuinty to halt mineral exploration in the lands of two Aboriginal communities in Ontario so that the imprisionment of seven Aboriginal leaders can be brought to an end. This would also help protect two watersheds the communities have been fighting to keep healthy and clean.
