The Next Step in Protecting More of Algonquin

As you may know, Algonquin Park is the only park in Ontario where logging is still allowed.

The province recently announced an increase in protection in Algonquin Provincial Park from 22% to 49%. But it's not done yet.

There appear to be loopholes in the language leaving increased protection uncertain.

Please take a moment to comment on the Park Management Plan Amendment.

In order to be sure that the 49% is truly protected we must...

1. Ensure, through appropriate zoning, that all of the increase area is truly protected
2. Reduce the amount of roads in the Park and their impact on wildlife.
3. Protect all old growth forest in the park.

Let the province know how you feel about protecting more of Canada's oldest provincial Park, Algonquin.
